

PHONES BANNED IN PUBLIC PLACES ACROSS MAJOR CITIES

In a surprising new policy shift, several major cities have announced a ban on cell phone use in certain public places, including restaurants, movie theaters, parks, and public transportation. Officials say the goal is to reduce distractions, improve face-to-face communication, and increase public safety.

City leaders supporting the ban argue that phones have changed how people interact in public spaces. "We are seeing fewer real conversations and more people focused on screens instead of their surroundings," one official said. For now, the policy is being tested in select cities, with officials planning to review public response before deciding whether to expand it nationwide.
